About Safer Lives

The Safer Lives project is for parents of young people who are caught up in or at risk of offending or youth violence. It's about giving parents the tools and confidence they need - whether that's understanding their kids better, improving family relationships, or just feeling more supported.

Through an evaluation of the project, we hope to be able to show that by backing parents, we can help young people thrive too.

About the role

We're looking for a new Peer Researcher to join the *Safer Lives* project.

These are paid roles in a genuinely supportive team where you'll have the chance to learn on the job and build your own skills and experience whilst supporting an important piece of research into youth violence.

That's where you come in.

As a Peer Researcher you'll be the bridge between young people, their families, our team and the evaluators. You will:

- Meet young people and explain what the project's about in plain, simple language.
- Build trust with the families – and the young people in particular, so they feel comfortable opening up.
- Stay connected with them throughout, checking in with them so they don't drop out.
- Collect information – sometimes by asking tough questions, but always with care.
- Help us figure out the best ways to talk to young people so their voices are always front and centre.

Who we're looking for

We're not asking for degrees, CVs full of experience or formal research skills. Honestly, they're all great but that's not the point.

We're looking for people who:

- Are good at talking to people and making them feel at ease.
- Can listen properly – even when the topic's tough.
- Are respectful, reliable and open-minded.
- Understand how racism, discrimination and stereotyping can affect some young people and their families, especially when it comes to the criminal justice system.
- Can use their creativity to help deliver engagement and let people know about the difference the project is making.
- Have relevant lived experience (see the note below on this) or a genuine passion for supporting young people and families through difficult stuff.
- Want to learn, grow and make an impact.

You might be a youth leader, someone who's been part of a project like this, or simply a community voice that people trust.

By '**relevant lived experience**', we mean any knowledge or understanding that comes from your own life - not from formal study or work. This might include experiences such as being involved in or affected by youth offending, having contact with the police, facing school exclusion or other challenges in education, growing up in care, being a victim of violence, or having friends or family who've been affected by these issues. It could also mean feeling judged, targeted, or overlooked because of who you are or where you live. You don't need to share everything or fit a specific story - we're interested in how your experiences help you understand and connect with others.

What you'll get

In exchange, we offer:

- Full time salary paid at the real Living Wage.
- Employer pension contributions, beyond the statutory minimum.
- Training and support to boost your CV.
- Opportunity to develop your skills as a social researcher.
- The chance to shape how research with young people is done.
- A role where your lived experience and ideas genuinely matter.

How to apply

We've kept this simple:

1. Fill in our **quick one-page application form**. We don't need to know everything, just the basics.
2. Send us a **short statement** about why you're up for this. This could be written, a video, or even just a voice note. One or two pages is plenty if you're writing it, and less than three minutes if you're sharing a video or voice note.
3. We'll also ask you to fill out a quick **Equalities and Diversity Monitoring Form** to help us make sure we're as good as we can be with our recruitment practices.

No formal CVs. No long cover letters. Just you. And your voice.

If you care about young people, families, and healthier, safer communities – and want a job where you can learn on the go – we'd love to hear from you.

Before you go, here's the small print...

The role is based in London, from our offices in Greenwood Place, NW5 1LB. **Full time** means five days each week, Monday to Friday, from 9am to 5pm most days, but with some flexibility to fit into the lives of the families we will be working with, who don't always keep office hours.

There may be flexibility to work at home some days, but you will spend a lot of time in the areas where the research is taking place (we are still negotiating our sites), talking to young people and the people who support them. We will also want you to join us in the office every week to spend time with other team members and share what has been happening with you.

The salary for this role is £26,936 per year.

Recruitment timeline

- Interviews will be held on Thursday 20th August **in person** at our office in Kentish Town.
- We plan to make a decision shortly after this. Hopefully within a week.
